JAIN TEMPLE NEWS CHITHARAL JAIN TEMPLE CARVED TO PERFECTION



On the banks of the river Tamraparni, amid the lush greenery and gigantic rocks, is the Chitharal Jain monument, which was erected as an abode of the Jain monks of the Digambara sect. Known as malai kovil among the natives of the Melpuram village, the place of visual beauty and charm is hardly a two hour drive from Thiruvananthapuram and eight kilometres from Marthandam, which is in Kanyakumari district of Tamil Nadu. One can walk up the Thotti Palam, which is one of the longest and tallest aqua ducts in India. As you pace through the stone path with green bushes and overgrown weed on either side, you will first reach a park founded by the Archaeological Department with stone benches and rock sculptures. As you move further, you come across a shady peepal tree with several names inscribed on it and a flight of stone staircases that lead to the Jain temple. After squeezing yourself between the two rocks, which act as a gateway to the Jain monuments, you could

try entering the calm and cold innards of the cave. This rock cut cave temple is centuries old and was built during the reign of the Jain King, Mahendra Verma I. The temple is abundant with life size rock carvings and sculptures of Thirthankaras and has idols of Jainatheertha Parswanathan and Mahaveer. Several hibiscus plants surround the temple and a small pond is situated right in front of the temple. Though the place is unbelievably beautiful and surprisingly clean, you may not find any guide, so a little background reading about the place would come in handy. 
900-YEAR- OLD - JAIN BASADIS IN HALEBEEDU BEING NEGLECTED BY ASI



These historic sites are slowly eroding due to lack of maintenance. Vijayi Parshwanath temple at Bastihalli in the town and Jain basadi's are losing sheen everyday. The foundation of the temple are slowly developing cracks. The roof of the temple leaks during rainy season. The temple supposed to have been built in 1133 by then Hoysala king Vishnuvardhana is worth visiting only during summer, as the floor, walls and roof start flaking and releases water droplets during rainy days and cool the atmosphere. The bats have made the temple their homes making the temple premises untidy. The priceless sculptures are being eroded. Weeds have made their way surrounding the temple and on the roof. The Manasthamba of temple is becoming brittle and delicate everyday, say locals. The basadi's will be a thing of the past if the neglect continued, they add. Bridge cave in Meanwhile, a bridge near the Dwarasamudra, a crucial link between Halebeedu and Hassan

town has caved in posing danger for commuters. The road is used by heavy vehicles and buses. A portion of the bridge collapsed on Wednesday while there was heavy rush on the road. The sudden caving in of the bridge created panic among people. The bridge is decades old and had been poorly maintained all these years. The residents have appealed to the PWD to immediately take up repairing of the bridge. The daily commuters have appealed the concerned authorities to take take up immediate repair works on the bridge to facilitate the easy movement of the traffic on the bridge. BIRTH CEREMONY OF LORD SAMBHAVNATH CELEBRATED



Shravasti: The birth ceremony of the third proclaimer of Jainism Lord Sambhavnath was celebrated with great fervor at Shravasti. A huge chariot procession was also taken out from Digambar Jain temple. It was launched by state minister Daddan Mishra by breaking a coconut. Jain devotees and a number of foreign tourists participated in the chariot procession. After starting from the Digambar Jain temple, the chariot reached the original birth place of Lord Sambhavnath at Mahet where the three 'Indras', Nitesh Jain, Saurabh Jain and Abhishek Jain, performed 'Mahamastikabhishek' of the Lord. Thereafter, Nitesh Jain of Bahraich bid highest for 'gyanmala', 'poolmala' and 'sahasramala' of the Lord and won it. Shobhanath Temple is one of the important temples of

Shrawasti. Many pilgrims visit this temple every year. The `Shobhanath` temple at Srivasti is believed to be the birthplace of Jain tirthankar `Sambhavanath. Shrawasti is an important center in Jain religious history.

ANCIENT JAIN TEMPLE IN KERALA BEING RENOVATED



Palakkad: The ancient Jain temple in Palakkad district, representing typical Jain architecture, is all set to reopen after renovation. The historic Digambar shrine, of Chandraprabha, the eighth Thirthankara in Jainism, was in a dilapidated condition for long. Suffering ravages of time, its brickworks were damaged and cracks appeared on the temple walls. However, through massive renovation which began two years ago, the structure has been restored to its past glory and is expected to be open on next year. Digambar Jain temple at Jainimedu, located about three km from Palakkad town, was built by a family of diamond merchants who came from Kanakahalli in Karnataka centuries back. Three merchant brothers - Ejjenna Shetty, Doddu Shetty and Payappa Shetty - used to visit Kerala for trade. During one such visit, the second brother -- Doddu Shetty

- died of some illness. Their brother's untimely demise saddened the two others. They visited Elacharya Muni, a Jain saint living in the area to find a way to relieve themselves of their sorrow and built the temple in memory of the deceased brother.

They later settled around the shrine with their families and in due course of time around 400 Jains came to be settled in and around the temple. As majority of them were pearl and diamond merchants, the place later came to be known as "Manikyapattanam" (diamond town) and "Muthupattanam" (pearl town). The place also came to be known as 'Jainimedu' due to the presence of the Jain temple. It is believed that, the temple was built between BC 100-500. Some say that our ancestors had roots in Gomadhagiri in Magadha in ancient India. But some others believe, they had come from Karnataka.

SANTHARA AN ESTABLISHED JAIN PRACTICE TO ATTAIN SALVATION

Amar Chand, 76, died after observing "santhara", a centuries-old Jain practice where a person starves to prepare spiritually for their death. Mr Chand's family members in the city of Ajmer said, he had been ill for some time and decided to fast. He attained salvation by observing santhara. Two more women in the state - Kela Devi and Dhanni Devi - are observing the practice and have given up eating. Some time back, a Jain woman, 60-year-old Vimla Devi, died in the state capital, Jaipur, after fasting for 14 days. Vimla Devi, from Jaipur, observed Santhara, a centuries-old Jain practice, where one starves to spiritually prepare for death. Vimla Devi was terminally ill and suffering from cancer. Her family says that her decision to observe Santhara was sanctioned by a Jain cleric and her family members. She had expressed her wish to adopt Santhara and give up her life and for 14 days she did not eat or drink. Vimla Devi's family did not mourn or cry at her funeral. Instead, a large number of people from the community took out a procession and chanted prayers along the way.

Her fast led to a petition in the state's high court by critics who say the practice is similar to suicide. Nikhil Soni, who filed the court petition, says he tried to break her fast and had even informed the local police asking them to take action. But police told him they were seeking legal opinion on the issue. Defending the custom, a female Jain priest, Sadhvi Shubhankar, said, Santhara is centuries-old and cannot be compared to suicide. "It is not an act of suicide, it is an act of rational thinking and courage." In the last few years, there have been nearly a dozen cases of Santhara, including one some months ago when a Jain cleric starved to death in Sriganganagar.

It is very unfortunate that a section of the society is questioning santhara and equating it with suicide or sati. Sati is the ancient Hindu practice in which women die on their husband's funeral pyre. It is an old tradition and has religious sanction, it is similar to a Sikh carrying a kirpan. Jain Samta Vahini, an organisation representing the Jain community, has claimed that every year, around 100 people observe "santhara" to attain salvation. It is normal among Jains and we regard it with utmost respect. However, Campaigners want the practice banned, saying it is similar to suicide.


CHRISTIANS AND JAINS HAVE MANY THINGS IN COMMON: CARDINAL TAURAN



Christians and Jains need to join hands together to preserve and promote life with dignity and freedom, said Cardinal Jean-Louis Tauran, President of Pontifical Council for interreligious dialogue. He was speaking at an inter-religious seminar in New Delhi on November 13 that highlighted the similarities between the two communities. "Christians and Jains have many things in common. As Christians, we believe that life is very precious and the Jain religion too upholds the sanctity of life and urges its promotion and protection," said the cardinal. He said that "our vocation to promote respect for life, non-violence, peace and harmony in today's world brings us together with the common bond of mutual affection for each other.' The cardinal called on all the protagonists of politics, economic and social

communications to do everything in their power to "promote a culture which respects human life." The seminar was part of the cardinal's 10-day visit to the country during which he held deliberations with leaders of different faiths. He met with the Hindu delegation in Pune and the Sikhs in Amritsar. Sadhvi Sadhna from the Jain community said that a person has to believe in his/her religious scriptures as no religion teaches hatred or non-violence. "We have to shun violence, ego, hatred from within ourselves, only then we will be able to bring a change in the world," she said. She said that the world will not have to conduct such conferences to promote peace and harmony if "we bring a change in ourselves.' Fr. Vincent Sekhar, associate professor of Philosophy, marked out areas where the two communities could "seek to do something jointly with their religious and other assets in mind." Some of the areas he specified were protection, preservation and promotion of life, work of the betterment of ecology and environment and preparing religious texts on major themes like family, social life, diversity and equality. The seminar was organized by the pontifical council for inter-religious dialogue, Archdiocese of Delhi, Catholic Bishops' Conference of India and world fellowship of religions.

Later at Prince Galada Gardens, the six were felicitated by P Jothimani, Judge, Madras High Court, and P Raja, ADGP of EOW, Chennai.

India displaces the United States as third largest exporter. Beef exports are forecast to rise 5 percent in 2012 on robust global

demand, particularly by Southeast Asia, the Middle East and North Africa. India accounts for nearly half of world growth in 2012 on increased supplies and price-competitive shipments to emerging markets. Expansion enables the rising exporter to nudge the United States to become the world's third largest exporter. The United States maintains gains achieved since in 2003, the last year before the BSE detection in Washington State, to reach record level exports. FRENCH GOVERNMENT OUTLAWS VEGETARIANISM IN SCHOOLS



14 October 2011, A governmental order issued on October 2, 2011 has determined that all meals served in school canteens in France must contain animal products, and that meat and fish will be served at a certain minimum frequency. This implies that by law from now on no vegetarian can eat at any public or private school in France. Six million schoolchildren are now forced to eat animal flesh, whether they wish to or not. For many families lunch at home is not an option. At best, a vegetarian student will be allowed to leave the meat on the plate, and consequently suffer from inadequate and imbalanced meals. Following a law voted last year by the French Parliament, similar decrees will be taken shortly regarding almost all

forms of catering from kindergarten to hospital, prisons and retirement homes. Vegetarianism will then have effectively been banned for a large part of the population. These measures ostensibly aim at ensuring the nutritional quality of the meals. Animal flesh is imposed as the only source of good quality protein and iron and dairy products as the only sources of calcium, in disregard of the fact that all these nutrients can be obtained in adequate quantity and quality from plant and mineral sources. The internationally recognized fact that: appropriately planned vegetarian diets, including total vegetarian or vegan diets, are healthful, nutritionally adequate, and may provide health benefits in the prevention and treatment of certain diseases [and that] well-planned vegetarian diets are appropriate for individuals during all stages of the life cycle, including pregnancy, lactation, infancy, childhood, and adolescence, and for athletes is flatly ignored.

No practical considerations warrant a blanket prohibition of vegetarianism even in those canteens where the management is willing to offer vegetarian or vegan alternatives. These decrees are thus an arbitrary violation of the rights of the vegetarian citizens of France. The European Vegetarian Union wishes to point out that the decision that many citizens have taken not to eat animals is not a mere dietary whim or a nonconsequential choice of lifestyle, but follows, for many of them, from deeply held beliefs about the way animals should be treated. A democratic government cannot arbitrarily restrict the beliefs of its citizens nor the practice thereof. The Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union, which is binding on member states including France, holds that: Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion. This right includes freedom to change religion or belief and freedom, either alone or in community with others and in public or in private, to manifest religion or belief, in worship, teaching, practice and observance.

The public debate regarding animal rights and the moral status of animals is active in France as in many other countries. Citizens are entitled to choose freely where they stand on these issues, and those who believe that they cannot, in conscience, accept to eat animals must not be discriminated against. A government cannot settle a philosophical, ethical and political debate by restricting the rights of those who disagree with its own positions. For years, the official policy of the French government has been openly hostile to vegetarianism. The French agriculture minister, Bruno Lemaire, declared in January 2010 that the government's aim in determining its public nutritional policy was to defend the French agricultural model and specifically to counter initiatives such as those of Paul McCartney calling for a reduced consumption of meat.

MP (INDORE) TAKING LEAD IN PRODUCTION OF AHIMSA SILK



Forest Department has selected Indore as centre for increasing production of Tussar silk from Antheraea Pernyi genes of worms. Tussar is also popularly known by its Sanskrit name 'kosa' and is cherished for its natural golden colour and texture. It is extracted from cocoon only after the silk worm larva leaves it, and hence, it is also known as 'Ahimsa' silk. The proposal for setting up a Tussar silk production unit on an area of 950 hectare in Indore has been devised under the Forest Development Scheme of MP Government. Around 1000 hectares area will be provided under the scheme in Indore

district. As per the estimates the proposed project would facilitate collection of around 20 to 25 million cocoons from Indore circle. The Sericulture Department distributes worms to the locals at no cost and purchases cocoons from them at a rate of Rs. 1.55 per cocoon. Anyone engaged in cocoon collection can make around can really make good money from the activity. The rearing and collection period for the cocoons is around two months, while November-December is the best season for introducing cocoons. During last fiscal, Tussar production was undertaken on more than 100 hectares of land in Jhabua and Alirajpur in Indore circle.

Then I appeared for CAT examination and was able to make it to IIM Ahmedabad. Talking about my experience with normal education, and schooling, yes, there were certain challenges. In regular schools, you will always find there would be certain people who will be very supportive to you, some would be neutral and others would not be supportive at all. Overall, I would say the experience was quite cordial, especially with the teachers."

Sahil Doshi, 12, and Sanil Doshi, 10, are the youngest to have ever completed an annual religious fast that takes place at the Jain Center in nearby Buena Park, USA. According to the Jain Centre spokesperson, "the two boys were the youngest to ever participate in the religious fast since the inception of the 'Jain Center of Southern California' located in nearby Buena Park". CAN JAINISM SURVIVE IN 21ST CENTURY?

A few religious communities like Parsees and Jews have identified the threat to their existence. The Parsis have managed to survive after arriving in India. However, today they are raising very few children and are on the verge of extinction. Half the Jews in USA marry outside. Studies show that most grandchildren of Jewish non-Jewish marriage do not identify with Judaism. But they have at least recognized the problem. Jain community appears to be completely oblivious of the future it faces. There are no debates or discussions. Many Jains today discount the census count (4,225,053 in 2001) and claim that the actual number of Jains is much higher, although without any supporting data.

The only reason given is that during the census, many Jains either do not identify themselves as Jains or the census takers on their own put them in the Hindu category. Even if we assume that there is a significant undercount of the Jains, trends show that actual number of Jains is going down as a percentage of total India's population, and this decline will accelerate. HISTORY

AN INTRODUCTION TO PRAKRIT LANGUAGES: Article By Mahavir Sanglikar

The meaning of `Prakrit' is `Natural'. The word prakrit is used for a group of languages spoken in ancient India. Jainism has a great relation with Prakrit Languages. In ancient India Sanskrit was spoken only by Vedic Bramhins, while common people's language was Prakrit. Jains always promoted their religion through people's languages. So most of ancient Jain literature was written in various Prakrit Languages.

Some of the Prakrit Languages:

Adhdhamagahi (Ardhmagadhi): Ardhmagadhi was the language of people in Magadh, Bihar. This language was spoken between 600 BCE to 100 CE. Vardhman Mahavir and his Ganadhars (Chief Disciples) gave sermons in Ardhmagadhi language. Mahavir's teachings were transmitted to next generation through oral tradition. Later the teachings were compiled by Shrideverdhigani in 454CE. Until that time the language was affected by time & influenced by Jain Maharashtri language. So the compiled verses are closer to Jain Maharashtri Language. The famous & popular Namokar-Mantra (also called as Navakar Mantra) of Jains is in Ardhmagadhi language. Shourseni: Shourseni was being spoken in Shoorsen (Mathura) region of North India between 100BCE to 500CE. Digamber Jains wrote their philosophical literature in Shourseni language. The Shatkhandagam and Acharya Kundkund's works are in Shourseni. In Sanskrit dramas of Bhas, Kalidas etc. Shourseni is used for dialogs of servants, jokers, Labours etc. Jain Marhatti (Jain Maharashtri): This was language of nonagamic Jain literature. Biographies of Teerthankars & great Acharys, Stories, Purans like paumchariya were written in this language. Jain Maharashtri was a language closer to Ardhmagdhi on one hand and to Maharashtri on the other hand. Marhatti (Maharashtri): This language was used for Jain epics and songs. Gathasaptshati is a famous work in Maharashtri language. This book was compiled by Haal, a Satavahan King. Modern Marathi language is second next step language in the evolution of Maharashtri. Apbhransh: The meaning of Apbhransh is 'Vulgar' or 'Impure'.

Apbhransh is not a single language but there are many Apbhransh languages which were born from various Prakrit Languages. Apbhransh languages were spoken between 500CE to 1000CE. There is lot off jain literature written in Apbhransh languages in medieval period. Most of the modern Indian languages have their roots in Prakrit Languages. Western Hindi, Khadi Boli, Urdu, Punjabi languages have their roots in Shourseni Apbhransh language. Eastern Hindi has its root in Ardhmagdhi Apbhransh, Marathi and Konkani languages have their roots in Maharastri Apbhransh, Bangla, Udia, Assamese and Bhojpuri languages have their roots in Magdhi Apbhransh, Gujrathi and Rajasthani languages have their roots in Nagar Apbhransh, Kasmiri language has its roots in Paishachi Apbhransh.

NATURAL REMEDIES FOR ENLARGED PROSTRATE

Antioxidants are substances found in your diet which have the ability to inhibit or slow down the oxidative process (damage from oxygen) caused by harmful substances called free radicals that will result in cellular malfunction. Also, antioxidants can improve the body immunity system, and reduce the chances for infections and cancers as well. Foods containing carotenes, Vitamin C, Vitamin E and selenium are powerful sources of antioxidants. In fact, if you follow an eating plan rich in fresh fruits, veggies, whole grains and nuts can effectively supply your body with its needs of the antioxidants.

Zinc is considered to be one of the most effective natural remedies for enlarged prostate. Actually, it is a trace element that is believed to play an essential role in cell growth, cellular differentiation, controlling the normal cell apoptosis (death), and building the immune system as well. Scientists suggest that Zinc is helpful for both: enlarged prostates and inflamed prostates, they correlate zinc-deficiency with prostate enlargement. Zinc is available in myriad food sources, including: oysters (best source of zinc), red meat, poultry, seafood, fortified breakfast cereals, beans, nuts, whole grains, and dairy products. Also, a daily zinc supplementation can be taken. The average daily dose recommended for the treatment of enlarged prostate is 50-100 mg. Usually, zinc is added to most multivitamin and mineral dietary supplements. Soy is one of the most important natural remedies for enlarged prostate. You might know that soy is a subtropical native plant, mainly grows in southeastern area of Asia. Though soy was used as a medical herb in Asian countries from five thousand years, it was introduced in Europe in the 1700 s and in U.S.A. in 1800 s. Soy is thought to be a very effective way to inhibit the start of all prostate troubles, in fact, all soy-based foods are rich in phytoestrogens (isoflavones), which are believed to have an estrogen-like activity in your body, thus limiting the production of testosterone (this is a male sex hormone that is thought to cause enlarged prostate in elderly). Foods which are common sources of soy are: roasted and green soybean, soy flour, tofu and tofu yogurt, soy hot dogs, soy butter, soy ice cream, soy milk, soy yogurt, soy cheese, isolated soy protein (e.g. Supro), and soy noodles. The recommended dose for BPH is 40-120 mg taken orally for one year. The Amish use watermelon tea to flush out the system and help with bladder problems and prostate problems. PITIABLE STATE OF COWS IN INDORE

I'm leaving Indore with a heavy heart, not because I am leaving behind dear ones I had come to visit, but because of what I saw on the streets of Indore and its outskirts. I am from Kolkata, where every year during a particular festival, cows are sacrificed in the open in certain areas, despite a Supreme Court judgment and umerous orders of the Calcutta High Court banning this practice. Like every year, this year too, I helped the petitioners in whatever way I could and then, to avoid the macabre spectacle, I came to Indore for a break.

My plans for a leisurely holiday went for a toss when, last Thursday, driving down Indore's Ring Road with my host, I saw

two chilling incidents. A cow and its calf were crossing the road when a school bus (registration number 1810) belonging to a certain Emerald School knocked down the calf. The animal had almost crossed over and had the driver slowed down just little bit, he could have avoided hitting the calf. Fortunately, the injury was superficial and the calf managed to get up and walk off. On intercepting the bus, the driver's cheekily suggested that since I wasn't injured, I ought to shut up. Further on, I spotted another calf, one of its hind legs bent at an impossible angle, hobbling along on the divider. I stopped and took a closer look. I was horrified to see the leg was broken so badly that the bone was sticking out, blood oozing and maggots festering in the wound. The local people nonchalantly informed me that the calf was roaming around like that for the last 3-4 days. I immediately shifted her to a go-shala called Ahilya Devi Jivdaya Sangh. As it was getting dark, the people there gave some first aid and I resolved to follow it up the next day. The day after, as I and my host were driving down to see the calf with the broken leg, I saw a tractor-trailer at GPO crossing parked on the roadside. From the layers of grime I could barely decipher that it was a municipality vehicle tasked to pick up stray (awara) cattle. Inside were two forlorn cows and a calf, waiting in the blazing sun for the workers to turn up. I located the workers inside a filthy shed, dark, airless, its floor covered with at least an inch-thick layer of dung, urine and some indescribable gooey mess.

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They were busy trying to drag out a cow, which had slipped and fallen in that muck and wasn't getting up. While some of them were twisting its tail (subsequently confirmed as broken), another suggested that water be poured into its ear to make it get up. Others kept pushing, beating dragging. One of them, with a liberal dose of abuse, suggested that the cow be left in that shed as they were getting late. It was at this point that I intervened and spoke to my associates in Delhi who put me through to Ms Payal Sodhi of Ms Maneka Gandhi's People for Animals. The cow, a magnificent Gir from the Mahatma's home state, was then moved to the veterinary hospital at Snehlataganj near Patthar Godam where the veterinarians concluded that not only was she running a fever and had diarrhea but was in an advanced stage of pregnancy.

These three incidents should act as a wake-up call to both the residents as well as the civic authorities to the plight of these cows, male calves and bulls, all victims of a zero-input, whatever-output unorganized dairy industry operated by a section of the population. Merely worshipping the holy cow doesn't change anything for the cows of Indore as they get run over, kicked, beaten and choke on plastic as they rummage through garbage driven by hunger. Please do not treat them as a traffic nuisance but as a humane issue. I request the civic authorities to provide their staff with hydraulic lift trucks and trained, sensitive staff to pick up all such cattle, move them to sheds and tag them so that they can be tracked to see whether they end up on the streets again or worse still, are clandestinely shipped for slaughter. Let Indore, the commercial capital of Madhya Pradesh, rise to the occasion and create a model that can be replicated in other urban areas.
